Carry on reading



Do you have problems reading print? This guide will help you find the material you want to read – books, newspapers or magazines – in a format to suit you.

You've always enjoyed reading – and want to carry on. However, you're finding it difficult because the print is too small, the pages are getting difficult to turn or you have other problems reading print.

The organisations in this leaflet can help – our services are free or available for a modest fee.

Using your local library

There is no need to stop using your local library just because your sight is failing.

- Most libraries stock large print books and spoken word audio tapes and CDs. They can also order titles for you through the national inter-library loan scheme.
- Some libraries now provide free access to eBooks as part of their service.
- Your local library may have access to the national online catalogue. This enables the library to check a book's availability in accessible formats from other sources.
- You can still take part in library reading groups and activities.
- Many libraries offer a range of other services including CCTVs and computers equipped with access technology such as speech and magnification software.

Large print



You can also buy audio books to download from commercial suppliers such as Audible. Files can be played directly from your computer or transferred to other devices such as iPods, memory sticks and SD cards.

eBooks and eBook readers

An eBook is a book in electronic format. Depending on what technology you use, eBooks can be read as audio (computergenerated speech), braille or large print, allowing you to choose the method that works for you. You can read eBooks using an eBook device such as the Amazon Kindle or on your computer or mobile phone.
